

Rectors of St Mary Magdalene Church, Tingewick 13<sup>th</sup> – 19<sup>th</sup> Centuries as taken from “The History & Antiquities of the County of Buckingham” by George Lipscombe, Esq. M.D., 1847.

Rectors named on the board in church are marked by an asterisk.

Geoffrey de Castro\*\* Rothamago, presented by the Monastery of St.

Catherine de Rothamago, resigned and was succeeded by

William Eton,\*\* presented by the same patrons

Robert ..... \*\*was the next possessor.

1303 William Relond, alias Iburnat, presented by the Prior of Hermandsworth, Co.

Middlesex, Procurator of the Convent de Rothamago

1314 Walter de Bray\*\*

1361 Robert de Walton\*\*

1375 Hugh de Derham,\*\* presented by King Edward III who had seized into his hands the Temporalities of alien Monasteries

1415 John Greene \*, A.M. presented by St. Mary Winton College in Oxford. ( He is the first Rector listed in church but the two sets of dates differ. )

1420 Robert Tomlyn\*\*

1440 Nic. Oselbury \* presented by the Warden &c. of New College, Oxford.

1453 Thomas Chalk, alias Chalke, alias Ywen, L.L.D., died 1473

1473 Thomas Dale \*

1501 Edward Rosse \*

1509 Thomas Makytt,\* or Makill, B.C.L.. He resigned.

1540 Alexander Belsire \* A.M. Can. Of Christ Church, Oxon. And First President of St. John's College. He was deprived by Queen Elizabeth.

1557 William Adde,\*\* “Parson of Tingewick”

1559 William Dalby,\*\* B.C.L. 17<sup>th</sup> February 1537. He was Chancellor of Bristol Diocese, but ejected under Queen Elizabeth.

1559 John Langland \*. A.B. Archdeacon of Buckingham; instituted a second time, in 1576, having accepted the Rectory of Great Linford. He was buried at Tingewick 7<sup>th</sup> November 1589.

1589 Erasmus Williams\*. He died and was buried here, and has a curious Monument in the Church.

1608 \* John Urrey, quitted this living in the Rebellion.

1645 John Good \*\*

1647 John Beesley \*, A.M. He was driven out.in

1657 by Stephen Sedgwick,\*\* who intruded and called himself Rector.

John Johnson,\*\* A.B. According to a footnote on the page, taken from Browne Willis, he was a Nonconformist.

1666 John Beesley \*\*re-possessed after the King's Restoration

1669 Thomas Edmonds A.M.\*\*

Stephen Penton, \*\* A.M. ( 17<sup>th</sup> January 1666 ). He was Principal of Edmund Hall, Oxon. In 1675; also Rector of Wath, and Prebendary of Ripon in York Cathedral, for which he resigned his Headship at Oxford 15<sup>th</sup> March 1683.

1676 Lancelot Bland \*, A.M.

1690 Thomas Oldys\*, L.L.B. He was buried here.

1720 Francis Edmonds\*, A.M. According to a second footnote, also from Willis's History of Buckingham "He greatly adorned the Church, made a handsome coved ceiling, repaired the Parsonage-house, and other buildings; and daily performed acts of charity in the parish. He has a Memorial in the Church-yard, erected by his parishioners, in token of gratitude and esteem."

1759 John Risley\*, A.M. inducted 22<sup>nd</sup> May, on the presentation of the Sub-Warden of New College, in the absence of the Warden and Scholars of the same.

1819 Justly Hill\*, A.M. on the presentation of the Warden and Scholars of New College, Oxon.

1816 – 5<sup>TH</sup> April 1822 Thomas Scott

5<sup>th</sup> April 1822 – Lady-day 1828 William Cotton Risley, A.M.

Lady-day 1828 – August 1829 Andrew William Gother, A.B.

September 1829 – 30, but not licensed Charles Causton, A.M.

March 1830 – July 1839 George Coleman, A.M.

1839 – the present worthy Minister George Varenne Reed, A.M. “
